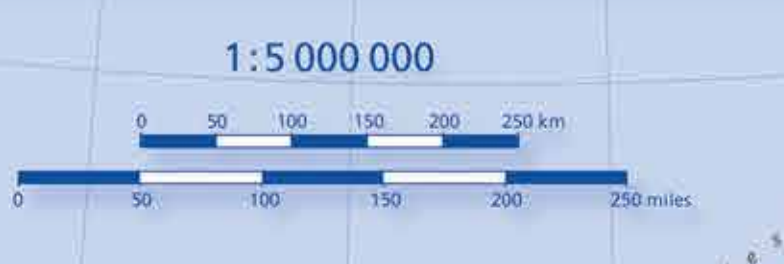

EuroVelo Route categories

The European Cyclists' Federation (ECF) is constantly working on developing the network but not all sections are ready yet. This map shows the conditions that you are likely to experience when out and about. Five different categories have been used:

Certified EuroVelo route
High-quality sections, evaluated and certified according to the European Certification Standard methodology. The EuroVelo brand is integrated and visible.

Developed route (with EuroVelo signs)
Developed route (see below) that is additionally signed with EuroVelo panels.

Developed route
Sections that are ready to cycle, including national/regional signing. Information is available online on a portal linked to EuroVelo.com.

Route under development
Sections that need further developments, but works are ongoing or planned to improve them. Conditions on the route cannot be guaranteed. Information may be available online and linked to EuroVelo.com.

Route at the planning stage
Undeveloped sections with no detailed information available. The itinerary is a proposal for the best possible option currently available. Conditions on the route cannot be guaranteed.

Follow the EuroVelo signs



In more and more locations around Europe, official EuroVelo signage is being installed to make your journey even easier. Just look out for the distinctive EuroVelo signs, which can be incorporated within national signage schemes in several different ways (see examples below). As of 2022, 35,000 km of EuroVelo sections (across 24 different countries) are already signposted and ready to cycle. This represents 43% of the network. ECF updates this figure every year in its EuroVelo Route Status Report.

EuroVelo Network and coordination

EuroVelo is the European cycle route network – a network of 17 long distance cycle routes that connect the whole continent. Coordinated by the European Cyclists' Federation (ECF), the routes can be used by long-distance cycle tourists as well as by local people making daily journeys.

National EuroVelo Coordination Centres (NECCs)

At a national level, the organisation, development and operation of the route is undertaken by National EuroVelo Coordination Centres (NECCs). The composition of these organisations varies but often includes government bodies, tourism organisations, relevant NGOs, public transport companies and service providers. Their main tasks are:

- **Route coordination** – planning and lobbying for improvements as well as monitoring of route status
- **Signing coordination** – integrate EuroVelo route information panels in national standards
- **Communication of EuroVelo at national level** – nationwide integration of EuroVelo routes into information and promotion tools
- **Reporting** – annual documentation of route progress, usage monitoring, signing etc.

LENGTH: 11,150 km (6,928 miles)
START / END: North Cape (Norway)
END / START: Caminha (Portugal)
COUNTRIES: Norway, United Kingdom, Republic of Ireland, France, Spain, Portugal

Following Europe's western border, the Atlantic Coast Route combines contrasting landscapes from the majestic fjords of Norway to the sun-kissed beaches of Portugal.

2 EuroVelo 2 Capitals Route

LENGTH: 5,050 km (3,138 miles)
START / END: Galway (Republic of Ireland)
END / START: Moscow (Russia)
COUNTRIES: Republic of Ireland, United Kingdom, The Netherlands, Germany, Poland, Belarus, Russia

Dublin, London, Berlin, Warsaw, Minsk and Moscow: six compelling but different cities that are united by the Capitals Route. You can either start in the welcoming atmosphere of Ireland's Pubs or with a photo at the awe-inspiring Red Square in Moscow. In between you can combine first class dining, partying and culture in the capitals and other cities along the route that are best explored by bike. Away from the cities the route has much else to offer too, including the untouched Białowieża Forest between Poland and Belarus; the stunning Sarsouci Park in Potsdam, Germany; and the rugged Snowdonia National Park in the UK.

3 EuroVelo 3 Pilgrims Route

LENGTH: 5,600 km (3,480 miles)
START / END: Trondheim (Norway)
END / START: Fisterra (Spain)
COUNTRIES: Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Germany, Belgium, France, Spain

Looking for a bit of culture on your next cycle trip? EuroVelo 3 might be the answer. The route will give you a taste of some of Europe's famous pilgrim routes such as St. Olav's Way in Norway, the Oxen Trail in Denmark; and, perhaps most famously, the Way of St. James in Spain. Along the way you will be able to discover some of its most impressive religious buildings, including the stunning cathedrals of Trondheim, Cologne and Santiago de Compostela. Linking these sites, you will pass through many exciting cities like Gothenburg, Hamburg, Liège and Paris, which are famous for their cultural heritage, lively restaurants, bars or clubs.

4 EuroVelo 4 Central Europe Route

LENGTH: 5,050 km (3,138 miles)
START / END: Roscoff (France)
END / START: Kyiv (Ukraine)
COUNTRIES: France, Belgium, The Netherlands, Germany, Czechia, Poland, Ukraine

Europe is the world's second most densely populated continent and cycling across it from west to east (or vice versa) will give you a fascinating insight into the people that make up this diverse continent. The route passes through cities that should be on every cyclist's bucket list: Cologne, Prague, Kraków and Lviv. Walking for you are atmospheric old towns, outstanding architecture and history lessons a plenty. But you can still get away from the crowds on this route too, by cycling France's rugged northern coastline, visiting the forests, castles and vineyards of Franconia in Germany; or taking in the typically Dutch landscapes of towering dykes and open polders in Zeeland. EuroVelo 4 is so diverse that you would not know where to begin.

5 EuroVelo 5 Via Romea (Francigena)

LENGTH: 3,200 km (1,988 miles)
START / END: Canterbury (United Kingdom)
END / START: Brindisi (Italy)
COUNTRIES: United Kingdom, France, Belgium, Luxembourg, Germany, Switzerland, Italy

Over a thousand years ago, pilgrims traveled all the way from England to Rome. After the Eternal City, the route continued to Jerusalem through the port of Brindisi, along the ancient Via Appia. Now, you can follow their footsteps by cycling EuroVelo 5, our 3,200 km version of this legendary route. The route passes through 7 different countries and links both modern and ancient institutions, with many cathedrals, churches, monuments and museums mixing along this route with the major European Institutions in Brussels, Luxembourg, Strasbourg. Whether you want a short break or a long adventure, EuroVelo 5 offers something for everyone!

EuroVelo 6 - Atlantic - Black Sea, is one of our most popular routes and it's little wonder why: coasts, rivers, castles, top-class infrastructure and a nice flat topography make it every cycle tourist's dream journey.

7 EuroVelo 7 Sun Route

END / START: Valletta (Malta)
COUNTRIES: Norway, Finland, Sweden, Denmark, Germany, Czechia, Austria, Italy, Malta

Explore Europe from the far North to the sunny South. The Sun Route will whisk you from the land of the midnight sun to island hopping in the Mediterranean. Culture, sunlight, mountains and a good dose of history make for an unforgettable adventure. There is so much to do: visiting nine European countries (including stops in the cycling havens of Malmö, Copenhagen, Berlin and Bolzano); tackling the Alps, reaching the tip of the 'Italian boot'; and experiencing the sunny archipelago of Malta to mention just a few highlights. Well, what are you waiting for?

Sparkling emerald seas, kilometres of golden sand, mysterious islands, wonderful food, ancient cities... It is not hard to find convincing reasons to travel along the Mediterranean by bike!

9 EuroVelo 9 Baltic - Adriatic

LENGTH: 2,000 km (1,249 miles)
START / END: Gdansk (Poland)
END / START: Pula (Croatia)
COUNTRIES: Poland, Czechia, Austria, Slovenia, Italy, Croatia

It may not be the longest of EuroVelo routes but EuroVelo 9 has so much to offer. Rivers, seas and mountains are on the checklist, and EuroVelo 9 is packed full of adventures over its (relatively) short distance. Start with a refreshing ride on the Baltic coast and finish the trip with a relaxing swim in the Adriatic Sea. In between you can enjoy welcoming local communities with exquisite culinary traditions in Poland, Czechia, Austria, Slovenia, Italy and Croatia. This route is sometimes called the Amber Route as historically the precious stone amber, found in the Baltic region, was taken by routes such as this to the Mediterranean Sea!

10 EuroVelo 10 Baltic Sea Cycle Route

LENGTH: 9,100 km (5,654 miles)
ALSO CALLED: Hansa Circuit
END / START: Wherever you like!
COUNTRIES: Sweden, Finland, Russia, Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Poland, Germany, Denmark

The coastline of the Baltic Sea takes in beaches, cliffs, woodland, ports and marinas as well as thousands of islands large and small. EuroVelo 10 will give you the perfect opportunity to get better acquainted with this enchanting corner of Europe. Dotted around the coastline are the beguiling capitals of Copenhagen, Stockholm, Helsinki, Tallinn and Riga, the glamorous city of Saint Petersburg, as well as the famous Hanseatic towns of Northern Germany and Poland. Visiting these destinations will allow you to experience the unique cultures that have developed around the coast of the Baltic Sea. In between, you will have a unique opportunity to get back to nature exploring the seashore.

11 EuroVelo 11 East Europe Route

LENGTH: 6,800 km (4,225 miles)
START / END: North Cape (Norway)
END / START: Athens (Greece)
COUNTRIES: Norway, Finland, Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Poland, Slovakia, Hungary, Serbia, North Macedonia, Greece

Labelled by some bicycle tourists as the 'Beast of the East', this route stretches from the northernmost tip of Norway all the way down to sunny Greece. Along the way EuroVelo 11 will lead you through seven extremely different capital cities: hip Helsinki, historical Tallinn, charming Vilnius, the 'Phoenix City' of Warsaw, the 'White City' of Belgrade, exciting Skopje and last but not least enchanting Athens. One of the appealing aspects of this route is that it also gives you an opportunity to discover fascinating parts of Europe that are not so well known (yet), such as the Tokai wine-growing region of Hungary, the Finnish Lakeland or Poland's Tatras Mountains. Give it a go and discover a favourite new destination!

12 EuroVelo 12 North Sea Cycle Route

LENGTH: 7,250 km (4,505 miles)
ALSO CALLED: North Circuit
END / START: Wherever you like!
COUNTRIES: Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Germany, The Netherlands, Belgium, France, United Kingdom

The North Sea Cycle Route will surprise you with its diversity. Although bordering the same sea it goes from land located below sea level (in the Netherlands) to cliffs over 1,000 meters in height (Norway). You can sample wee drams in Scotland; pedal along the well-maintained cycle paths of Denmark; dance the night away in millennial party cities such as Gothenburg or Hamburg; or stretch out on the inviting beaches of the Netherlands or tuck into some moules frites at the Flanders Coast in Belgium. Expect to be pleasantly surprised along this popular bicycle route. And don't forget to check the ferry timetable!

13 EuroVelo 13 Iron Curtain Trail

LENGTH: 9,950 km (6,183 miles)
START / END: Grense Jakobselv (Norway)
END / START: Rezovo (Bulgaria)
COUNTRIES: Norway, Poland, Russia, Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Poland, Germany, Czechia, Austria, Slovakia, Hungary, Slovenia, Croatia, Serbia, Romania, Bulgaria, North Macedonia, Greece, Türkiye

Experiencing the history of Europe's division! For almost half a century, Europe was forcibly divided into East and West. EuroVelo 13 retraces this 'Iron Curtain', a border stretching from the Barents Sea to the Black Sea. Following this route for more than 9,950 km is a living history lesson but also provides a welcome reminder of the peace and reconciliation that have followed the fall of the 'Curtain'. As one of the longest EuroVelo routes, the Iron Curtain Trail has something to offer every type of cycle tourist, from the vineyards in southern Czechia and northern Austria to the mountainous border of Bulgaria and Greece; and from the bustling ports of the Baltic States to the stark beauty of Lapland. EuroVelo 13 is recognised as Cultural route of the Council of Europe.

14 EuroVelo 14 Waters of Central Europe

LENGTH: 1,100 km (684 miles)
START / END: Zell Am See (Austria)
END / START: Debrecen (Hungary)
COUNTRIES: Austria, Hungary

A pleasant route linking rivers, lakes and spas across Austria and Hungary, EuroVelo 14 - Waters of Central Europe provides an important east-west link and connects several former existing EuroVelo routes. The route's name refers to the fact that it also connects several important waterways located in central Europe. Indeed, the theme is arguably stronger when experienced on the route as it becomes apparent just how much of the itinerary is located close to water. EuroVelo 14 connects some beautiful landscapes and also provides a great cycling adventure for those that want to travel longer distances. Additionally, the route is very well served by train services.

15 EuroVelo 15 Rhine Cycle Route

LENGTH: 1,500 km (932 miles)
START / END: Andermatt (Switzerland)
END / START: Hoek van Holland (The Netherlands)
COUNTRIES: Switzerland, Germany, France, The Netherlands

The Rhine Cycle Route runs along one of the longest rivers in the world on the Swiss Alps to the North Sea. The Rhine has fostered a cultural and economic dialogue between the Alpine regions and Northern Europe for over 2,000 years. Explore the beauty of this river landscape and the picturesque towns and villages lining its banks. On the way you can visit several UNESCO World Heritage Sites such as the famous mills of Kinderdijk. As the first certified EuroVelo route, EuroVelo 15 is suitable for cyclists of all fitness levels and abilities and there is plenty to see along the way including Lake Constance and the continent's largest waterfall (the Rhine Falls) and port (Rotterdam).

COUNTRIES: Switzerland, France

Experience the Rhone Cycle Route! Following the course of the River Rhone, EuroVelo 17 starts in Andermatt, a charming alpine village of Switzerland, and ends over a 1,000 km later on the beautiful Mediterranean coast of France. Connecting the Alps, Lake Geneva, the lavender fields of Provence and the wild white horses of the Camargue, up to the Mediterranean sea, EuroVelo 17 packs in a surprising amount of different cultures, landscapes and experiences.

The Meuse Cycle Route follows one of the most important rivers in Europe and welcomes cyclists of all levels! From the plateau of Langres via Hoek van Holland to Rotterdam, step on your bike and discover 3 countries (France, Belgium and Netherlands) by cycling over a thousand kilometres of marked routes. This attractive and varied route offers ever-changing scenery, with charming towns and villages on both banks of the river, plus there are plenty of cultural heritage sites and culinary treasures from beginning to end.
